My dear Friends

Many years ago, I was awakened by the sounds of doors shaking and things around me rattling. It took me a few moments to realise that I was experiencing my first mini earth/seaquake! We all abandoned the buildings and headed towards the sea. I noticed that many hundreds of people had grabbed what was most precious to them as they had exited their properties. Many people were in their bathrobes, clutching wooden boxes which contained their prized possessions. Recently, I saw in the papers, the tragic images of homes teetering on the edge of wave-battered cliffs before collapsing on to the beaches below. The thought did run through my mind, were I in that situation, what would I consider precious enough to grab before I raced from the house?

Today's readings ask us what we perceive 'most precious' in our lives? The Pearl of Great Price, in this Sunday's readings, place before us a number of images/analogies/metaphors in which we are invited to discern the preciousness of our relationship with Christ, and the kingdom of heaven. One of the great mystics tells us that it is very unlikely we shall find a pearl of great price sitting on the beach or on the rocks! If we want to find that precious pearl we shall have to learn how to dive for it.

I guess that challenge here is to ask ourselves three questions:

- How precious to me is my relationship with Christ?
- How precious to me is the Kingdom of heaven?
- For **me** what in life has the *ultimate* value?

To a large extent, my responses to these questions will unfold the commentary of my life! My words and my actions will bespeak what is most precious to me. What I perceive as the most precious, having the ultimate value to me, will be what I clutch to my heart, and cling to, when the world around me seems to be imploding, or falling apart.

The gospel today unfolds for us how precious and life-giving that relationship with Christ is for each one of us. We are not going to *find* that precious relationship as casually as picking a precious pearl off the beach. Like any relationship, relationships do not just *happen...*relationships have to be 'worked at'...if we deem them precious to us!

We all know that the pearl is created by an irritant within the oyster. The oyster's response to irritation and pain is to create a thing of beauty. Our human condition being what it is, as I reflect on my life's experiences, I think I know why some of the pearls in the oyster can be a little distorted and twisted! It is often by allowing the reflective love of God to flow through us, and in us, that his healing and restorative love can make the slightly twisted and distorted pearl into a thing of unique beauty. In the ever-hopeful words of the mystic: what strikes the oyster shell does not damage the pearl!!

And so, my dear friends, we can ask ourselves, is my relationship with the God who loves me truly precious to me? Is it my pearl of great price? As we hear in other parts of the sacred scriptures: where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. All too often, we put off 'diving' for that pearl, putting it on the 'back-burner' of our busy lives until 'we have more time' – and then life is over before we know it!

This is the 'now' when we are both invited and challenged to discern and respond!

- 1. Where am I? I am mentioned in Genesis (21:22-34). My name means well of seven or well of oaths. Why am I named so?

SAINT OF THE WEEK: St John Boste (feast-day 24 July)



John came from
Westmorland and studied
at the Queen's College,
Oxford University, before
becoming a Fellow of the
College and being ordained
in the Anglican Church. At
some stage he converted to
the Catholic faith and was
admitted to the English

College at Rheims, where he was ordained in 1581. He returned to England soon afterwards and worked very effectively for 12 years in the North, where he had a price on his head. Relentlessly pursued by the authorities, he was eventually arrested after celebrating mass at a Catholic house near Durham in 1593. St John boldly confessed to his priesthood and ministry. He was imprisoned and later transferred to the Tower of London where he was tortured on the rack and in other ways, but he disclosed nothing. It seems that the more the martyrs were tortured the more they found strength to persevere in their faith. When returned to Durham for trial, St John denied all involvement in political affairs, saying that 'Our function is to invade souls and not to meddle with these temporal invasions.' He was nonetheless found guilty of treason and condemned to be hanged, drawn and quartered. He was executed on 24 July 1594, after being forbidden to speak. He managed just to say, 'I hope in God that if you will not suffer me to speak unto you in this world this, my death, will speak in your hearts that which I would have spoken.'

If you have not already booked your normal 'weekly mass time' then:

- i) Send an email request to this email address: icmassbookings@gmail.com and state
 - a. Your name and address.
 - b. The total number in your household coming to Mass (let us know if there are under 10s).
 - c. The preference for the day of the week and mass time you wish to attend. (If you can give a second choice that will help if there are too many requests for one Mass time).
 - d. Whether there is a special circumstance (e.g. wheelchair access, working hours)
- ii) Call this number **0800 2461372** and leave a message. We provide this option for those who have no access to the internet. If you have internet access, please email us.

You must specify the day of week and time you would like to attend Mass. This will be your usual Mass time each week. For the time being, you cannot book more than one Mass a week to allow as many people as possible to attend Mass. We are asking those who are retired, and those who can attend a Mass during the week, to sign up for a weekday Mass. Please do not 'swop' mass bookings, rather cancel them through the booking system, so we can release seats for those on shift work etc. Those who work unpredictable shifts should email us on a Wednesday for the following week. When your booking is confirmed, you will receive details of your seat and row number in Church. Numbers 1-10 are on the Sacristy side and 11-20 on the Lady Chapel side. Please try to arrive at the recommended time so we can prevent a queue.

There will be no toilet facilities available.

Each mass must have 3 stewards, so please volunteer if you can by emailing the office. **Attending mass:** There is a one -way system operating in the church, with the entrance through the main porch and exit through the side fire exits. Please see the details on the website and the noticeboard as you enter church. Please feel free to wear a face covering /gloves in church except to receive Holy Communion. Collection boxes are available for offerings on the way out. Where possible, please bring gift aid envelopes or an ordinary envelope with your gift aid number on it. Unless otherwise specified, donations are for the general running of the church. Diocesan / Government guidance states that:

- You will need to sanitize your hands on the way in and out of church.
- The congregation should not stand or kneel during mass as this reduces social distance.
