## My dear Friends

How many times have we heard this incredibly beautiful gospel about the sower of the seeds?! I can almost hear your thoughts: I know what he is going to say next...our words and actions are the seeds we plant, and then the fruit, or crop, we harvest!!! Jesus does explain the parable to the disciples about what can block us from 'receiving' the Word of God – hearts which have become coarse and hardened, and lock out his love; ears that no longer 'hear' his voice, but have tuned into other, easier-to -listen-to, 'stations'; and eyes which have been blinded by ego, greed and power. Welcome to the human condition!

However, Fr. Dennis Hamm, S.J., unfolds other facets for understanding the symbols of sower and seeds in this gospel: ... There is reason to make seed serve as a double-duty symbol. Indeed, Matthew, in the scene immediately preceding this parable's discourse, has provided an episode illustrating how a community of people is created by their response to the word of God (bolding of font, mine!). When Jesus is told that his mother and brothers are standing outside asking to speak with him, Jesus stretches out his hand toward his disciples and says, "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of my heavenly Father is my brother, and sister, and mother" (Mt 12:49-50).

If I am not mistaken, the will of my heavenly Father is that we truly Love one another! Please bear with me patiently here, as I remind us that when Jesus speaks about 'Love' it has nothing to do with a warm, fuzzy sentiment! It is the AGAPE, the foundation, translation, interpretation, of our love for, and relationship with God, and others. This is embodied in the ways in which we Care, Respect and are Just towards others...and I guess, ourselves, too!

One of the tragedies of a distorted, passionate love of God can be the ways in which, in our quest to embody his message, we can become ruthlessly hardened, deaf and blind to the foundational Agape of God's Love! Globally and communally, this is experienced in the 'atrocities committed in God's name'. A consuming passion for what one person perceives God wants, can result in the 'other' becoming mere collateral damage to this distorted quest.

I guess, today, we have to reflect on, not just the seeds we plant, but the *care, respect and justice* required in planting them.

# SAINT OF THE WEEK: ST JOHN PLESSINGTON Continuing the Series on the 40 Martyrs of England and Wales (thank you Dudley)

Ordained under the assumed name of Scarisbrick in 1662 in Spain, St John (feast-day 12 July) ministered in Wales, at the Holywell shrine of St Frideswide, and then in the Wirral, where he pretended to be tutor to a family of children. Following the fabrication of the Titus Oates plot, he was arrested in 1679 as one of more than 25 innocent Catholics who were accused of treason and executed. His speech from the scaffold proclaimed his innocence of any crime in being a priest, 'But I know it will be said that a priest ordained by authority derived from the See of Rome is, by the Law of the Nation, to die as a Traitor, but if that be so what must become of all the Clergymen of the Church of England, for the first Protestant Bishops had their Ordination from those of the Church of Rome, or not at all, as appears by their own writers so that Ordination comes derivatively from those now living.' He also declared, 'I protest in the sight of God and the court of Heaven that I am absolutely innocent of the plot so much discoursed of and abhor such bloody and damnable designs.... I had rather die than doubt any point of faith taught by our holy Mother, the Roman Catholic Church.... God bless the King..., and grant His Majesty a prosperous reign here and a crown of glory hereafter.' This is the material of which martyrs are made, whose only goal was the restoration of the country to the true faith, so that his merits and intercession are part of the treasury of grace available to us today through our prayers. St John, pray for us.

## If you have not already booked your normal 'weekly mass time' then:

- i) Send an email request to this email address: icmassbookings@gmail.com and state
  - a. Your name and address.
  - b. The total number in your household coming to Mass (let us know if there are under 10s).
  - c. The preference for the day of the week and mass time you wish to attend. (If you can give a second choice that will help if there are too many requests for one Mass time).
  - d. Whether there is a special circumstance (e.g. wheelchair access, working hours)
- ii) Call this number **0800 2461372** and leave a message. We provide this option for those who have no access to the internet. If you have internet access, please email us.

You must specify the day of week and time you would like to attend Mass. This will be your usual Mass time each week. For the time being, you cannot book more than one Mass a week to allow as many people as possible to attend Mass. We are asking those who are retired, and those who can attend a Mass during the week, to sign up for a weekday Mass. Please do not 'swop' mass bookings, rather cancel them through the booking system, so we can release seats for those on shift work etc. Those who work unpredictable shifts should email us on a Wednesday for the following week. When your booking is confirmed, you will receive details of your seat and row number in Church. Numbers 1-10 are on the Sacristy side and 11-20 on the Lady Chapel side. Please try to arrive at the recommended time so we can prevent a queue.

There will be no toilet facilities available.

**Each mass must have 3 stewards**, so please volunteer if you can by emailing the office. **Attending mass:** There is a one -way system operating in the church, with the entrance through the main porch and exit through the side fire exits. Please see the details on the website and the noticeboard as you enter church. Please feel free to wear a face covering /gloves in church except to receive Holy Communion. Collection boxes are available for offerings on the way out. Where possible, please bring gift aid envelopes or an ordinary envelope with your gift aid number on it. Unless otherwise specified, donations are for the general running of the church. Diocesan / Government guidance states that:

- You will need to sanitize your hands on the way in and out of church.
- The congregation should not stand or kneel during mass as this reduces social distance.
